ELG 13—People and Communities

Children talk about past and present events in their own lives and in the lives of family members. They know that other children don't always enjoy the same things, and are sensitive to this. They know about similarities and differences between themselves and others, and among families, communities and traditions.

During group time, Dolly is quiet and sometimes needs support to focus and respond to a question. Dolly is developing her ability to recognise when she has done something well and accept the praise that is given to her.
